#### LIVERPOOL'S FIRST RADIO STATION 6LV 1924 -1930

The lecture will follow the history of the station until its demise in 1930. There will be photographs in the form of a small exhibition. RON DAVIES - Sadly, we report that one of our faithful supporters has passed away. Ron Davies was a regular of SARA activities, in particular our day trips and holidays. It was an indication of his populari-

ty by the number of people who attended a very packed St Anne's Church on 11th March to pay their respects. Our deepest sympathies to Ron's family.

#### SARA'S FESTIVE EVENING

The weather was atrocious, bitterly cold with icy pavements and, just for good measure, a flurry of snow descended an hour before we



were due to start! No matter, those who braved the elements had a really good time listening and dancing to Mike Doody's music. A quiz kept teams of people amused and frustrated and there were murmurings of 'of course' when the answers were revealed. A raffle held on the evening raised £45 for KIND.

#### JOHN MOSS OF OTTERSPOOL (1782-1858)

On January 21st, 45 people attended a very interesting talk given by Graham Trust on this little-known but very influential figure both in Liverpool's history and on the world stage.

John Moss lived in Otterspool House in Otterspool Park, which was demolished in 1931. He was the first Chairman of the Liverpool and Manchester Railway and a friend and supporter of George Stephenson – indeed, the latter reputedly built a model of his railway in the dry bed of the River Jordan in Otterspool Park. Another close friend and associate was John Gladstone, father of the future MP and Prime Minister William Ewart Gladstone. His other railway interests were in the Grand Junction Railway from Newton-le-Willows to Birmingham and subsequent new lines linking England, Wales and Scotland. He also invested in railways abroad: the Paris and Rouen line in 1843 and the Dutch Rhenish railway in 1856.

Moss was one of the founders of St Anne's Church, Aigburth (where his mausoleum can be seen in the small churchyard) and of St Michael's in the Hamlet, the 'cast-iron' church. He was also a partner in an independent bank in Dale Street. He inherited from his uncle, sugar plantations in the West Indies together with a workforce of about 1000 slaves, and he was instrumental in first moving the newly emancipated slaves from the Bahamas to what was then British Guiana, in order to keep their community together; and was subsequently a leading light in the abolition of the slave trade.

He died at home in Otterspool House on 3<sup>rd</sup> October 1858 of 'exhaustion' (as noted on his death certificate) – not surprising given all his commitments!

Graham has written a biography of John Moss, following seven years' research sparked off by his purchase of a house in Alma Road in 2002 and the discovery with the deeds of a copy of Moss's will.



#### MY AIGBURTH

On Friday 11th March 2011, Mr Paul King treated his audience to a very entertaining and informative evening called "My Aigburth".

He reminisced about his childhood and memories of his father, who was head gardener with wages of a £1 a week, to Miss Marsh (I.M.Marsh), from the time his father dug out the swimming pool with a spade to going to Abersoch to Miss Marsh's holiday home there, when his father had to go before everyone else to get the

grounds and gardens in good order. Mr King and his mother and sister would then travel down to spend six weeks there with the other staff.

During the First World War all the horses were commandeered but the Liverpool Cricket Club horse, which used to pull the mower to cut the grounds, was taken home by a lady and kept in her house (must have been some house!)

Mr King also told us how the roads around Aigburth were named after Heroes and Battles (Dundonald, Wingate, Lyttelton, etc). Old photographs were viewed with interest and a good time was had by all.

#### **BURY MARKET DAY TRIP**

A full coach departed from SARA Hall for Bury Market under a dull, cloudy sky for our first dose of retail therapy of the year — a sure sign that spring can't be far away. Our shoebox contributions have been much appreciated by the troops in Afghanistan, as you will see from the following extracts from 'thank you' letters received by SARA:

"I am currently working in a welfare cabin by our tents where we are lucky enough to have a TV and computer, all the welfare boxes people send in get put in there and the lads can help themselves, this is a good morale boost when we were all tired from being out of camp for days at a time and don't have to worry about toiletries etc. I don't think the lads have bought a tube of toothpaste since we've been out here. It is also a boost to know people back home are thinking about us."

"The cold weather is really starting to draw in now, so getting parcels from home really is something we all look forward to. .... I have about 15 other Scousers in my company out of 110 men, so Liverpool is fairly well represented. ..... our heartfelt thanks to you all."

"We are now two months into our six month tour and all your contributions are making our time here a lot easier."

"The super noodles were really nice to have while I was watching the football (sorry I'm a Man U fan). I have been out here since September and my R&R is at the end of January and I can't wait. Thank you again."

"We do spend quite a lot of our time away from camp out and about and to get back and open welfare parcels always raises a smile and the guys are all very grateful."

"The contents have been shared out between a small group and everyone is grateful for the mix of toiletries, treats and useful bits and pieces. Above all, receiving gifts from people I have never met shows the solidarity of support from people back at home. I have never known such levels of support during my 21 years in the Army and it makes an incredible difference - especially to the younger soldiers. Each and every gift represents somebody who cares, wants to contribute but rarely seeks recognition for their effort. I have two months left to serve in Afghanistan so I will be away from my family during Christmas (again!). Knowing that people in the UK are thinking of us will give me, and others, strength."
