AIR CADETS FLOWN BY EX CADET NOW A NAVY PILOT

Ex 7F (1st City of Liverpool) Air Cadet Lt Gareth Mills RN returned to his old Squadron last December after an absence of 20 plus years. Lt Mills now with the Naval Flying Standards (Fixed Wing) in Yeovilton offered the chance of a lifetime to two of the current cadets.

Lt Mills, a Hawk Pilot at RNAS Yeovilton, arranged for the two young people to go down to his base, stay overnight and then to fly with his unit the following day. Cdt Sgt Chris Kelly (18) and Cdt Cpl John Lavin (16) were chosen by OC Sqn as they had been awarded Best Cadet and Best Recruit for their previous year's performance within the Squadron.

The cadets were escorted throughout an extremely exciting day by Lt Mills, starting at 0745hrs. They were shown round the base, taken to the Fleet Air Arm Museum on a whistle stop tour - a place well worth visiting if you are in the area - shown the Flight Simulator that is used to help train the Lynx helicopter pilots, given a thorough medical and measured for all the equipment that would be required for the flight.

All this culminating in the ride of their lives, both cadets

were extremely quiet when they landed after their experience, totally overawed by it all.

The journey home was much noisier as they got their breath back and re lived the best day of their young lives.

Lt Mills attributes his interest in aviation to Mr Harry Caldwell and Mr Tim Robinson, who are both still Squadron instructors, and wished to give something back to the Squadron who encouraged him to aim for the sky!

Festive recipe



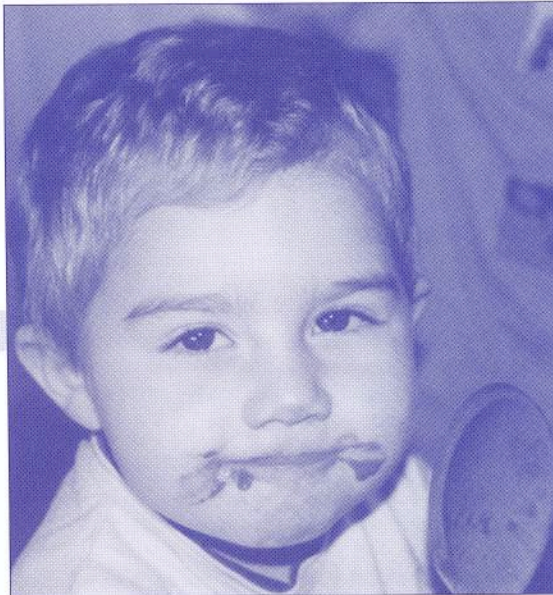
Goopy Chocolate Pie

Serves 12
To Make: 10 mins
Cooking: 20 mins
To Set: 3 hours
38g fat

350g (12oz) short crust pastry
Plain flour for dusting
225ml (8fl oz) double cream
85g (3oz) unsalted butter
1 1/2 tbsp Caster Sugar
400g (14 oz) plain chocolate, broken into small pieces
1 tbsp Brandy (optional)
3 tbsp milk (whole preferably)
Fakes of plain chocolate to decorate

1 Preheat the oven 190°C, 375°F, gas 5.
Roll the pastry out on a floured surface to the thickness of a pound coin and line base of a 9 inch greased flan tin. Chill for 10 mins. Line the pastry with greaseproof paper; fill with baking beans and bake blind for 10 mins. Remove the beans and paper and bake for a further 5 mins, until golden. Cool on a wire rack.

2 Meanwhile make the filling. Heat the cream and sugar in a pan until simmering. Add the butter and 350g (12 oz) of the chocolate, stirring off the heat

until melted. Allow to cool for 10 mins then vigorously stir in the brandy and milk, a little at a time. If the chocolate starts to go stiff, let the mixture cool a little longer before adding the remaining milk. Pour the filling into the cooled pie and place in a cool place (not the fridge) for 3 hours.

3 Flake some plain chocolate on top to decorate.

History

Liverpool Castle

If you were to stand in front of the Crown Courts in Derby Square you are next to Queen Victoria's statue, but travel back 750 years and things would be much different indeed.

In 1232 this was merely a rocky piece of high ground where below you could see a small inlet off the river, this is where fishing and merchant boats sheltered. This inlet eventually disappeared as buildings and street emerged, but its name was 'the Pool' and this it would retain.

In 1642 Liverpool Castle stood on the site, an impressive structure with four towers. The Roundheads attacked the castle, looking to capture it from Prince Rupert. Thousands of Royalist troops were trapped inside, on the verge of surrender.

By the mid 1700's the Corporation of Liverpool had ordered its demolition. The castle had fallen into disrepair and local vagrants were squatting in the towers.

Today there's no trace of the building that once dominated Liverpool's skyline, but it still lives on in the street names close to where it stood, such as Castle Street.

The building of the castle

Liverpool Castle's history is unclear in parts, it is believed to have been built sometime between 1232 and 1247 and very little is known about the early structure, in 1347 the castle had four towers and was surrounded by a dry moat, excavations on the site in 1927 revealed the remains of the original moat. The castle like most Norman castles of the time included a chapel, bakehouse, brewhouse herb garden and an orchard.

It was during the Civil War that the Castle witnessed some of the most dramatic scenes in Liverpool's history when royalist and parliamentarian forces vied for control. In May 1643 the Parliamentarians took the town and with it the

crucial supply route to Ireland. Prince Rupert, having famously declared that a parcel of boys could take Liverpool, gained control of the castle for the Royalists in 1644 but only after a week of fighting and the loss of 1500 of his men. The parliamentarian John Moore regained possession of the castle, and following the royalist defeat, Parliament ordered that the castle be demolished, but only sections of the walls and gatehouses were taken down. The castle was in ruins by the early 1700's and it was demolished with the bricks recycled for other buildings.

In 1976 excavation of the site of the new Crown Courts uncovered a ditch which was believed to have formed part of the Civil War defenses. Today the Castle is commemorated by a plaque on the side of the Queen Victoria monument. Local legend says that tunnels led through the sandstone from the castle to the river through which Parliamentarian soldiers escaped from the castle during the Civil War.

During the Second World War much of the area around the Victoria monument was seriously damaged by bombing, with the Victoria monument looking out across a wasteland of rubble. The site has been significantly redeveloped since and is now flanked by modern buildings on three sides.

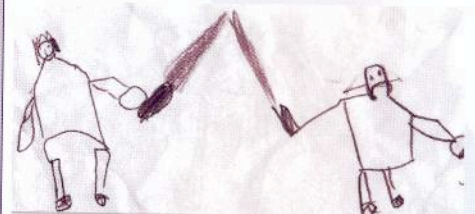

St Margaret's Sports Centre and "Cricket Centre of Excellence"

Good News! The Sports Centre and "Cricket Centre of Excellence" scheme at St Margaret's High School, Aigburth, is set to become a reality!

The St Margaret's scheme, as part of the Liverpool City Council Big Lottery Sports Project, has been awarded £810,955. The total project cost is now £1,893,000. The remaining money is being provided by several St Margaret's Governors' funding streams.

As many of you will have noticed, building work is well under way and the new "Cricket Centre of Excellence" should open its doors for the first time in January 2006.

Our architect, Cowan & Co., have taken the very best advice on the latest cricket centre design from Old Trafford and have incorporated flexible, individual nets, dedicated shock pads for one spinning and three pace bowling lanes and specialist lighting into the planned development. Other features include video facilities and a video playback/coaching room. A fitness suite is also planned in a second phase.

At present it is envisaged that the school will use the sports centre during the day, with the facilities being available to the community after school, in the evening until 9pm, weekends and during the school holidays. The community aspect of the project is very important and in order to meet the needs of our user groups, advisory committees will both guide and elevate the centre's activities. The Partners Committee and the Liverpool Cricket Development Group, as key user groups, will be invited to participate fully in the future plans for the centre.

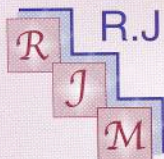

Word Facts

Cloud

The earliest use of cloud is recorded in old English, in the sense "a mass of rock; a hill". It is found in a few place names that make reference to this sense, such as Thorp Cloud. Later it was used in the same sense as clod to mean "a consolidated mass of earth or clay" indeed **cloud**, **clod**, and **clot** are likely to have come ultimately from the same root. The current sense, "mass of watery vapour", was first recorded in 1300, in a reference in the medieval work the *Cursos Mundi* to the sun climbing the clouds.

Allerton Police and Community support officers have now been working together as a team for six months. The results have been tremendous. A shop watch system set up in Church Ward to reduce crime and disorder in pubs and shops has been so successful it is to be extended to Aigburth Vale and Childwall. Youth disorder has been targeted in a number of areas aided by Chris Peach the local authority neighbourhood manager we have secured funding to purchase off road mountain bikes to combat the problem in locations vehicles can't reach. This combined with other initiatives has seen the levels of disorder fall by as much as sixty percent. I am never complacent about disorder though, I am aware we tend to move it around and just dilute it to an extent. We are now focussing our efforts around the North Sudley Road area. We have been aided particularly by Councillor Tina Gould with the full support of Councillors Ron Gould and Dave Antrobus in securing a section 30 order in the area around North Sudley. This will allow the Police to disperse groups of two or more youths, between certain hours, congregating and annoying residents. We will be exercising a common sense approach to this initiative, as we are aware of the effect it can have on children who live in the area. If you have any concerns about this proposal or are suffering from any problems at all please feel free to contact me at Allerton Police station.

As the Christmas season is now upon us I would like to remind everyone when out shopping, don't leave packages in the car, put them out of sight to prevent opportunist thieves. Please leave your car keys away from the front door to prevent them being reached through the letterbox.

I would like to take the opportunity to wish everyone a very merry Christmas and a successful New Year.
