The Crofton Estate - What does the planned development mean for the Sudley Area and its Residents?

A second application has been submitted to Liverpool City Council to develop the Crofton site. A public meeting was held at St.Anne's Hall on Monday 1st March, to discuss the new proposal, chaired by Rev. Amey and with local Councillor D. Antrobus in attendance.

Although the new application is scaled down from the first one, the issues highlighted remain largely the same (increased traffic, loss of light, loss of privacy, safety of children from the infant school and nursery, the height of the block of flats, the trees with a conservation order and the effect on the main house itself) so again, many objections were raised. To date 450 letters have been signed. Closing date for objections was 11th March.

SARA received many letters and emails and as a result recently wrote to the City Council on behalf of the local residents regarding the proposals.

We will continue to update you on the progress of the development in future issues. Local residents do have the power to influence, if they work together.




Table Sale at SARA Hall



Many of you may be aware that it is now over two years since The Traveller's Rest and Ye Old House At Home have closed down. As can be seen in the photo, the present condition of these buildings is not good.

Since the closure of these local pubs both buildings have experienced incredible vandalism and arson. SARA have spoken to the City Council in an attempt to find out more information.

Apparently there have been two planning applications, one of which was approved with conditions some time ago, however no development has commenced leaving local residents and businesses with the continued prospect of having to put up with the eyesore and continued vandalism.

SARA will be working to ensure progress is made to improve the situation.



Supporting Local Enterprise

One of the most unfortunate consequences of inner city growth is undoubtedly the decline of local businesses as we know them. In the Sudley area alone we have seen the recent closure of at least two traditional pubs and the decline of many small retail shops, resulting in the deterioration of period buildings in which they operated.

With the expansion of trendy, fashionable wine bars on our high streets and city centre, the poor old pub hasn't stood a chance. This cannot just be a result of city renewal, there must also be a change in our attitudes towards our local services. Why is it that we are so fickle with our attitude towards supporting our local businesses? Not only do they provide an invaluable service, but they are also our neighbours. Still however, many of us prefer to drive ten, fifteen, twenty minutes away just to buy a paper and milk. Why?

We are tremendously influenced by fashions and trends, many of which are very short lived, and as a result the local services that we should cherish, suffer greatly. From the local fruit stall to the local pub, they are all struggling to compete with the multi million pound retail giants operating close by, but there seems to be no real excuse for not porting local businesses, they are much closer to where we live, even within walking distance (walking being a function used less and

less mind you). What is more frustrating is the lack of concern from local residents. Do we really not care what happens locally? Don't we think that empty shops and burnt out pubs are a disgrace, in fact shameful?

There is great potential for the Aigburth Vale area, if high streets not so far away can thrive, surely we can too, but it must start at home. A consorted effort has to be made from residents to avail of the local services in our area. Like anything good, everyone must make an effort, you can't wait for someone else to make the first move, take the initiative and stop the retail decline of our beautiful area.

This ethos also applies to our recreational areas, don't let them tumble into decline, join together as one voice and tell our councillors that the deterioration of areas such as Otterspool park, cannot continue. What are we paying such high council tax for if our local amenities are unkempt and unsafe? Only our voices can sound the chant for change, only you and I can urge for improvement. We can't just hope that someone else will do it, we must take the initial steps ourselves, show everyone that we do care, that we are proud of where we live, we are capable of being European Capital of Culture, but we need to show our concerns, show our support, use our voices, be heard!!

SARA working with Merseyside Police



Aigburth & Garston Neighbourhood Police - April 2004

My name is Ian Roche and I am the Inspector responsible for policing the Aigburth and Garston Neighbourhood.

It is now some five months since my initial article and a lot has been going on within the neighbourhood. We have recently won funding to purchase two state of the art mountain bikes which will be used by officers from Garston police station. In addition, my colleague in the St.Michaels neighbourhood has purchased two all terrain quad bikes. The idea is that with the summer months approaching people begin to use our parks and open spaces. This can bring with it a rise in crime particularly violence and robbery. The purchase of such equipment gives us the ability to proactively patrol more open space, raising our visibility and therefore increasing the deterrent to commit such crimes. We will also target those people who take it upon themselves to race around our open spaces on such machinery which is a danger to others using those facilities.

With the Easter and Summer holidays approaching our schools become targets for offences of burglary. We have noticed a big increase in attacks on our schools over recent months. Such premises become an attractive target for two reasons, 1. they are unoccupied overnight and 2. they contain valuable computer equipment. Numerous attacks have taken place during the early evening and I would ask residents who live close to such establishments to dial 999 if they see any suspicious activity. For our part we will increase our activity around schools and we are in the process of marking all equipment within schools with SMARTWATER technology.

Anti social behaviour continues to be a problem. I have recently spoken to the council regarding those areas still to be alleygated. There are still a number of objectors preventing the gates from being erected. Experience shows us that alleygates reduce crime, reduce incidents of anti social behaviour and improve the quality of life for local residents. I am happy to discuss these issues with any person who may have reservations about the effectiveness of such schemes.

Finally, overall crime within the neighbourhood is showing a downward trend. I would like to thank everyone for their extra vigilance which seems to be paying off. However I would reiterate the crime prevention message. Think security, don't leave windows and doors open, don't leave valuables on display and look after your neighbours.

Our History

This section will take a look back at past times and hopefully rekindle your memories of the area

Sudley House

In this edition we move to Sudley House. I'm sure that we all have memories of our younger years being taken around the Sudley Museum on a Sunday afternoon but do we know about the history of the house?


The history of Sudley House begins in the first decade of the 19th century. Nicholas Robinson, a rich corn merchant, bought the land for £4500. The exact date and the architect are unknown. Some exterior features suggest it may be the work of Thomas Harrison. He was working on a number of commissions in Liverpool between 1811 and

Nicholas Robinson was the first resident in Sudley House some time around 1823. The building was completed the following year. Robinson who was a prominent builder became Mayor of Liverpool in 1828-9 and

> lived in the house until his death in 1854. His two daughters continued to live there until their own deaths in 1883.

> Sudley was then sold to George Holt. He made many alterations to the property and transferred the main entrance from the eastern to the northern front, creating a garden veranda on the eastern side. He extended the western end, which included building the tower which can be seen today.

> George Holt came from a family of prominent local businessmen. His father, George Holt



Holt founded the Liverpool shipping line Lamport and was a pioneer of

trade with Brazil and married Elizabeth Bright. Their only child Emma was born in 1862. The family originally lived in Edge Lane and then West Derby before settling at Sudley in 1884. Emma, who was 21 at the time, lived at Sudley for the remaining 60 years of her life. Emma was also a noted philanthropist. Like her father she was a strong supporter of Liverpool University. She never married, so with her death in 1944 George Holt's line came to an end. She bequeathed the house and the collection of paintings assembled by her father to the City of

George Holt began collecting seriously in middle age, around the late1860s. His early buying concentrated on English landscapes and genre pieces, prints and Chinese porcelain. After moving to Sudley in 1884, Holt spent less time on his various businesses. This semi-retirement meant he could concentrate more on his art collection.

This period is marked by his purchase of Millais's 'Vanessa' for £1,575 in 1885. After this there is a sense of his studying collecting

fashions, learning the market and discovering his own tastes. He added to his collection works by Turner and the Pre-Raphaelites. Towards the

end of his life he followed the fashion for late 18th century portraits British landscapes. It was during these years that he added works by Romney and Gainsborough to the collection.

George Holt did not collect art



just simply as a status symbol, Turner Painting on display at Sudley House

as some merchant collectors may have done. He paid a great deal of attention to the presentation of his works, from framing to glazing. He often weeded out works with which he was no longer satisfied. He would part exchange these paintings with dealers for fresh acquisitions. He favoured works with over religious themes, or at least saintly overtones. Themes of work and honest country life are also well represented. Although some works may be a little sentimental, the luxurious, immoral or sensual are noticeably absent.

The scale of the pictures in Sudley is small. Essentially this was governed by the size of the rooms in which they would hang. However, Holts taste for works that reflected everyday life made him unlikely to collect large and dramatic history paintings anyway.

Many of the features added since the 1880s can still be seen. The fireplaces, lincrusta wallpapers and oak panelling are still in place. The carved marble fireplace in the dining room bears the Holt family crest. It may have been acquired on one of the family's trips to Italy.

There is a real sense of a collection in Sudley House that was assembled to delight, instruct and give pride to a comfortable and right-thinking household of its time.

Today Sudley House is one of the few Victorian homes that still has many of its original features intact. It is also the only surviving Victorian merchant art collection in Britain still hanging in its original location.

Terrified people were ordered to stay in doors and teachers and their pupils at a nearby school (could it have been Sudley?) barricaded themselves in the building.

Eventually, the animal was cornered in a nearby entree and shot dead. He was taken to Liverpool Museum and later displayed as an exhibition item. However, he had another sorry ending as he was one of the casualties during the Second World War when Liverpool Museum was hit by a bomb and many artifacts destroyed. I was only a small child when my aunt told me this story and always felt pity for such a beautiful dignified animal to end up not only being shot and stuffed and put on display but being blown up as well.
